Benko Gambit The Benko Gambit is a completely different response to 1.d4 than say the Albin-Counter Gambit. This approach involves offering two pawns for one in an attempt to open up files a and b for Black. If the gambit is accepted then Black can put both rooks in command of the two now open files.

The Benko Gambit is a Queen ' s Pawn Opening which begins with 1. d4 Nf6 2. c4 c5 3. d5 b5 Originating from a Benoni Defense, black sacrifices a pawn on move 3 to strike back against the white center. Unlike many other opening gambits, the Benko Gambit is unique in that black ' s pawn sacrifice is not intended to generate an attack.

Benko Gambit - Chess Openings - Chess.com The Benko Gambit is a special answer to 1.d4 in which Black sacrifices a pawn right off the bat. If White plays 4.cxb5 then 4...a6 usually follows. Black hopes that the open a- and b- files, combined with a fianchettoed king-bishop, will give him great pressure on the queenside.

Benko Gambit Declined 4.Nf3 [A57] There are three games in the Benko. Game One features 4.Nf3 met by 4...bxc4, which is not my first choice for Black but seems to be playable. In the game White obtained a strong attack and then improved on previous experience on his way to victory.

A gambit (from ancient Italian gambetto, meaning "to trip") is a chess opening in which a player, more often White, sacrifices material, usually a pawn, with the hope of achieving a resulting advantageous position. Some well-known examples are the King's Gambit (1.e4 e5 2.f4), Queen's Gambit (1.d4 d5 2.c4), and Evans Gambit (1.e4 e5 2.Nf3 Nc6 3.Bc4 Bc5 4.b4).

The opening is named after the Russian master Benjamin Blumenfeld, and was later played by World Champion Alexander Alekhine. The opening position can also be reached via the Benko Gambit (1.d4 Nf6 2.c4 c5 3.d5 b5 4.Nf3 e6).

The opening is an uncommon defense to the Queen's Gambit. In exchange for the gambit pawn, Black has a central wedge at d4 and gets some chances for an attack. Often White will try to return the pawn at an opportune moment to gain a positional advantage. In the Encyclopaedia of Chess Openings the Albin Countergambit is assigned codes D08 and D09.

Blumenfeld Counter-Gambit Ghaem Maghami is one of the leading practitioners in the Blumenfeld revival. Here, in Game 11, he faces g2-g3 followed by Bf1-h3 in the Accepted, one of White's better ideas. It's hard to judge the positions that arise: White has an extra pawn, Black is dynamic but has nothing concrete, is it really enough, one wonders?
