The most dramatic example of this missionary activity was the effort to retake the Holy Land by force during the Crusades, but less-violent missions were undertaken in pagan Europe and in the Islamic world.

The crusades have a big affect in the church. The failure of crusades led to the lessen power of the pope. They lessened the power of feudal nobility and increased power of the kings. The crusades grew out of religious favor along with fever, feudalism and chivalry and this led to growth of trade towns and universities.

The increased authority of the papacy and the relative decline in the power of the emperor became clear in the unforeseen emergence of the Crusades as a major preoccupation of Europe. Gregory VII hoped to lead an army to defend Eastern Christians after their disastrous defeat by the Seljuq Turks at Manzikert (present Malazgirt, Turkey) in 1071.
