As older children, dual language learners may learn English after acquiring proficiency in their native language.

Dual Language Learners: Strategies for successful ...

The Office of Head Start defines dual language learners as children who “acquire two or more languages simultaneously, and learn a second language while continuing to develop their first language. The term “dual language learners” encompasses other terms frequently used, such as Limited English Proficient (LEP), bilingual, English language learners (ELL), English learners, and children who speak a Language Other Than English (LOTE)” (OHS 2009).

Many classrooms include children who speak languages other than English at home--some who have been learning two or more languages from birth, others who are first exposed to English when they enter preschool. Dual Language Learners - Child Trends

A substantial and growing number of preschool aged children are learning English as a second language. In 2006-2007, approximately 42 percent of California kindergarten children were identified as English learners. Current estimates indicate that approximately 39 percent of all children aged three to five are learning English as second language.

Understanding Dual Language Development

In California, nearly 60% of young children are considered dual language learners (DLLs), defined as children who are learning another language in addition to English from birth to five years of age. In 2019, 98% of licensed center-based programs and 70% of licensed family child care homes (FCCHs) in California served at least one DLL.
