

Theory Guided Practice Definition

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Definition: Guided practice is a teaching practice pioneered by Barbara Rogoff. It involves three steps for practicing new skills in the classroom. First, the teacher models how to do a task to the student. Second, the student does the task with guidance from the teacher.

Theory provides nurses with a perspective with which to view client situations, a way to organize the hundreds of data bits encountered in the day-to-day care of clients, and a way to analyse and interpret the information. A theoretical perspective allows the nurse to plan and implement care purposefully and proactively.

In terms of traditional science, a theory can be described as a set of established state- ments or rules that are able to be tested (Hardy 1978). The Theory of Reflective Practice in Nursing is a middle-range theory. It mainly proposes that nurses must practice reflection-before-action, reflection-in-action, reflection-on-action, and reflection-beyond-action to advance nursing practice.

In 1991 education theorists Lave and Wegner developed situated learning theory (SLT). The theory argues that knowledge should be learned in the same place as it is used. For learners, this means: We should learn like apprentices from a “community of practice”.
